2022'S THEME WAS A 'RETURN TO NORMAL." School felt normal. Work felt normal. Community events felt normal. We were excited to continue some of our traditional events this year as well as create new programs with our community partners.

WE BROUGHT BACK OUR Zero Waste Faire & Sustainable Living Expo to an outdoor venue in early summer with over 35 exhibitors and a welcoming crowd. We partnered with the Wilton Land Conservation Trust on a new Books and a Blanket series to engage our youngest residents in our outdoor preserves. We held our 2nd Annual Halloween Costume Exchange with an amazing turnout and praise for the annual event. We helped lead the Town of Wilton's Sustainable CT recertification process which awarded the town silver-level certification. We brought back our Green Drinks series to invite residents to engage, educate and inspire one another around green living in Wilton and so much more.

As WE LOOK AHEAD TO 2023 we are taking a different approach to our programming. Scaling back from one large signature event we are looking to engage more residents in various programs throughout the year. Still keeping many of our annual programs mentioned, we are excited to expand our presence at community events capturing food waste and recycling, put on our first **Repair Cafe**, host a **pumpkin smash**, work with more of our businesses to **divert food waste**, as well as support the Town of Wilton implementing a **food scrap collection program**. SUSTAINABLE CT CERTIFICATION

WGG TOOK THE LEAD on behalf of the **Town of Wilton** to reapply for Sustainable CT certification. Wilton was among 24 Connecticut municipalities to be recognized this year for achieving Sustainable CT certification. Wilton earned silver-level certification with **29 ACTIONS IN 13 CATEGORIES** for a total of **405 points**.

IN WILTON, A SAMPLING of approved submissions includes programs for buy-local initiatives, improvements in stewarded land and natural resources, expanding recycling materials accepted at the transfer station, continuing food waste reduction programs at school as well as air quality education, services for those experiencing economic hardships and investments in energy infrastructure.

OPEN TO EVERY TOWN in Connecticut, a Sustainable CT certification is awarded to communities who meet the qualifications that support state goals of climate change mitigation, waste reduction and open space acquisition. In return, towns who receive certification have access to best practices across the state, technical support and matching grant funding for sustainable initiatives by organizations or individuals.

CELEBRATING • OUR SIGNATURE EVENT ZERO WASTE FAIRE & SUSTAINABLE LIVING EXPO

SUNDAY, JUNE 5TH, 2022 - AFTER A TWO YEAR HIATUS, our **ZERO WASTE FAIRE & SUSTAINABLE LIVING EXPO** returned as a wonderful outdoor event held on the grounds of Wilton's Miller-Driscoll school on a sunny, beautiful spring day. We hosted visitors from all over Fairfield County including Danbury, Wilton, Stamford, Greenwich, Weston, Westport, Fairfield, Trumbull, Bridgeport, Norwalk and as far as New Milford, Essex and Naugatuck. Our goal was simple: to have every member of the family take home simple, practical ideas for sustainable, green living.

ATTENDEES HAD THE CHANCE to hear new ideas, meet inspiring, every-day environmentalists and engage with over 35 exhibitors encompassing non-profits, sustainable businesses, and local organizations. We know the event inspired that spark of green in many to make small lifestyle changes that deliver an outsized impact for our community and our planet.



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FAIRE ATTENDEES brought their large and small household items for free recycling:

- 52 mattresses/box springs
- 1.5 tons of paper shredding
- 2 Junkluggers Trucks of household items
- 9 pallets of e-waste (batteries, tvs, computers, and more!)
- 1 20-yard trailer of textiles
- 1 box of corks to be used for purposeful play in our preschool
- 1 box of markers to be recycled
- 50 eyeglasses

 15 LBS of non-recyclable or compostable trash
 WGG will plant 15 NATIVE TREES/SHRUBS/PLANTS around the community in coordination with the Town of Wilton Environmental Affairs Department
 10 LBS of food scraps collected to be turned into soil-enriching compost

SBEA PROGRAM

WGG WAS ACCEPTED into the **Small Business Energy Advantage Community Partnership Initiative (SBEA CPI)** with Eversource. Through this program, Wilton Go Green received funding to promote the SBEA program to local small businesses, private schools and nonprofits, allowing these organizations to improve energy efficiency measures in their facilities with little out-of-pocket expense. Over 18 Wilton businesses have participated in the program in 2022, resulting in improved workspaces, reduced energy consumption and cost savings generation. A win for our businesses and a win for the environment!



OUR GREEN SPEAKER COMMITTEE



WGG IN PARTNERSHIP with Wilton Library Association presented "Entangled and Ingested: Combating Plastic Pollution Through Art" with **DR. KAT OWENS**. Dr. Kat

shared how she uses the arts to communicate about the pervasive problem of plastic pollution. A researcher and artist, Dr. Owens has spent the last year and a half creating a series of forty-six lifesized portraits of animals harmed by marine debris. She creates most of the pieces herself by hand sewing film plastic onto canvas, but the largest pieces (including three life-sized whales) are being cocreated with the public.
