**2023 WAS A YEAR** of small but mighty. This year we stepped away from our biggest event and set a goal to host events and partner with others so as to be present in the community at least once a month. Looking back at the year, I am proud to say we achieved that goal.

WE CONTINUED OUR WORK staffing a table with our community partners like the Wilton Farmers' Markets,
Chamber of Commerce, Woodcock Nature Center and Ambler
Farm. We took a big leap into the world of hosting not one,
but two REPAIR CAFES at Cannon Grange and just WOW what a
response, with amazingly talented volunteers who helped us
keep treasured items from going into the waste stream.

WE CREATED A NEW TRADITION, hosting what we call our **ANNUAL COMMUNITY CELEBRATION at the Library** to shed a brighter light on people who are working to create a more sustainable Wilton.

AFTER YEARS OF DISCUSSION and starts and stops, 2023 was the inaugural year of **THE FOOD SCRAP RECYCLING PROGRAM at our town Transfer Station**. Connecticut is in a waste crisis and diverting food scraps away from the waste stream of incineration and to a composting facility is one of the easiest, most impactful solutions. The state has made this a priority for helping reduce the amount of waste being trucked out of state. We, along with the **Town of Wilton**, are proud to be a part of the solution.

I LOOK FORWARD TO the work of planning 2024 with our Board, adding in a few new programs and keeping the tried and true.

My closing will always be the same: **Wilton Go Green** would not be here if it were not for the dedication of our Board, Committee Members, volunteers and their passion to make a difference in our community. I'm forever grateful to each one of you.

#### **TABLING AT AREA EVENTS**

Spring—Fall 2023 was a very active time for Wilton Go Green. Tabling at events each month, we shared tips for swapping out single-use items for reusables, taught folks how to recycle right, educated Wilton residents on the glass separation program and the new food scrap recycling program and shared tips on further reducing food waste. Among the places we set our table:

- May October, Wilton Farmers Market once a month offered to collect food scraps from residents participating in the town program
- Chamber of Commerce 's Winter Carnival, Sidewalk Sale and Street Fair, Halloween Parade
  - Woodcock Nature Center's Frothy Forage
  - Ambler Farm Day sponsored Curbside Compost to collect food scraps
    - Cannon Grange Agricultural Fair and Expo
      - Ridgefield Earth Day

### MAKING THINGS HAPPEN THE WORK OF OUR WGG COMMITTEES



#### **GREEN SPEAKER COMMITTEE**

OUR **GREEN SPEAKER SERIES** was packed in 2023! We heard amazing speakers on a range of topics:

- K-12 Climate Action in Connecticut focusing on how the education sector can lead on climate solutions in Connecticut.
- Trash Talk discuss the state of Connecticut's municipal solid waste and recycling
- Breathe Easier Navigating the Hazards of Indoor and Outdoor Air Pollution discussing potential health risks from exposure to indoor and outdoor air contaminants and what we can do to protect ourselves and advocate for effective public health policies.
- Sustainability in Fashion: Curating an Ethically Conscious Closet giving us insights into the current state of fashion, its effects on the environment and how we can shop smarter and more sustainably.

We are so thankful to **Wilton Library** for continuing to partner with us on the Green Speaker Series.









#### **WASTE REDUCTION COMMITTEE**

As the State of Connecticut grapples with the waste crisis and how to manage an extra 800,000 tons of trash, they have identified key factors to help minimize and manage that waste. 32% of our state's municipal solid waste in Connecticut is food waste. Diverting food scraps to composting has become a #1 priority for the state.

Working with the Town of Wilton, the long awaited FOOD SCRAP DROP OFF RECYCLING PROGRAM launched in January at the Town of Wilton Transfer Station. Wilton residents can now drop off their food scraps to Wilton's Transfer Station to keep food out of the waste stream and instead turn our food scraps into soil rich nutrients to feed the earth. Participating residents had the opportunity to receive free compost from their food scraps.

As of our print date, Wilton has diverted 23,040 lbs. - that is, 11.25 tons - of food scraps from our waste stream.





#### **ZERO WASTE SCHOOLS COMMITTEE**

OUR **Zero Waste Schools Committees** continue to hold bi-annual **ZERO WASTE WEEKS** in each of the Wilton Public Schools to raise awareness on the importance of source separating in the cafeteria but also waste reduction initiatives that can be done in the home.





### MAKING THINGS HAPPEN WGG PROGRAMS • SUPPORTING LOCAL EVENTS



#### REFILL NOT LANDFILL

BILLIONS OF SINGLE-USE CUPS ARE USED each year in the U.S. for to-go beverages and those paper cups are NOT recyclable and end up in incinerators.

Following the lead of some of our non-profit friends, we created **THE REFILL NOT LANDFILL** program. From April to August, residents were encouraged to bring a clean, reusable cup or mug for refill at a participating local business or receive a discount when buying a reusable cup or mug from participating local retailers.

#### **CIRCLE OF CARE**

WE JOINED FORCES WITH **Circle of Care** this year to host a **COMMUNITY SHRED DAY FUNDRAISER** for both organizations! With the help of our sponsors, **Fairfield County Bank** and **John Schiaroli** of **William Pitt Sotheby's**, we were able to collect and shred **4,000 lbs** of paper to be repurposed **= 10 trees saved**. We had a wonderful turnout and look forward to making this a yearly tradition.

#### TRACKSIDE TEEN CENTER—REUSE WILTON

WILTON, a day of purposeful play in a reusable kind of way! Reuse expert and Box Truck Tiny Home builder Alex Eaves showcased his Box Truck Tiny Home and screened his new film "The Box Truck Film." We had reuse activities for all ages and displays on how small moves of reusing and repurposing make a BIG difference.











#### REPAIR CAFÉ — SPRING AND FALL

THE GREENEST THING YOU CAN DO is try to fix something you already have before throwing it away! In partnership with the **Cannon Grange** we hosted our first **Spring and Fall Repair Cafes**. We were lucky enough to find amazingly talented volunteer fixers who helped repair small appliances, lamps, clothing and textiles, jewelry and bicycles. We also had great consultants offer residents technical support on their computer questions, talk about woodworking projects and even offer advice on houseplants and gardening.

Our Repair Café was a gathering place for members of our community to not only try and repair a treasured item and give it a chance at a second life, but also learn alongside our volunteer fixers. And if we couldn't fix it, we directed residents to someone who could or at least knew we tried.







#### **AMBLER FARM**

1.3 BILLION POUNDS OF PUMPKINS are sent to incinerators and landfills annually in the U.S. Working with **Ambler Farm** we offered the first

PUMPKIN COMPOST DROP-OFF. Residents could visit the farm over a five-day period to drop off their jack-olanterns, pumpkins or gourds to be composted right at Ambler Farm.

#### **TRINITY SOLAR**

WILTON GO GREEN HAS CONTINUED our partnership with **Trinity Solar** helping many in our community find a way to explore solar and control their monthly utility bill. Through our partnership, WGG receives a financial contribution for every qualifying consultation and solar installation.



#### **OGDEN HOUSE GLASS RECYCLING PROGRAM**

THE TOWN OF WILTON PARTICIPATES in a glass separation program at the **Town Transfer Station** which separates food and beverage glass from the mixed recycling. The program was implemented to help reduce the amount of contamination happening in our mixed-stream recycling as well as ensure the glass was 100% recycled within Connecticut.

Noticing a barrier to residents of **Ogden House** who expressed interest in participating but who may have physical barriers, WGG organized volunteers to sponsor a weekly glass pick up. In the last year, volunteers have collected over 1,000 food and beverage glass containers from Ogden House and brought them to the Transfer Station.





#### **BOOKS AND A BLANKET**

...IS A FUN AND EXCITING partnership with Wilton Land Conservation Trust and the Wilton Library Association in order to allow families and children to immerse themselves in nature. Families joined us at a WLT preserve, where they heard stories from our town librarians, created an upcycled craft led by Wilton Go Green, and went on a short walk around the preserve with WLCT.





#### **WILTON LIBRARY**

TOGETHER WITH the **Wilton Library Association** we hosted **THE YALE WHIFFENPOOF ALUMNI**, composed of alumni from the 1960's and '70's. Over 100 attendees enjoyed an evening of A Capella music benefiting both organizations.
